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A MESSAGE FROM OUR PRESIDENT & CEO

The past year has been a powerful reminder of what can be accomplished when faith, perseverance, and community come together. The unwavering commitment of our donors, partners, volunteers, and staff has carried our mission forward in extraordinary ways. Their compassion and dedication to survivors have been a constant source of encouragement, making 2024 a year of resilience and renewal.

Call to Freedom continues to grow in both reach and impact through our three foundational pillars: **Prevention, Intervention, and Restoration**. These pillars guide every aspect of our work and ensure that survivors are supported at every stage of their healing journey. Through **Prevention**, we engage communities, raise awareness, and equip individuals to recognize and stop exploitation before it begins. Through **Intervention**, we provide immediate, trauma-informed responses that meet survivors' urgent needs in moments of crisis. We use survivor-centered approaches and perspectives to meet survivors where they are and begin the healing journey. And through **Restoration**, we walk alongside survivors in long-term healing, offering the resources and relationships needed to rebuild lives full of love, dignity, and hope.

This integrated model has transformed the way care is delivered in South Dakota and indeed the nation, providing a continuum of support that is both comprehensive and survivor centered. None of this progress would be possible without the generosity and solidarity of those who stand with us.

Because of that support, Call to Freedom provided 659,676 minutes—the equivalent of 458 full days—of direct services in 2024.

There were 527 individuals served by Call to Freedom in 2024—more than any other year since our founding.

Each one of those minutes of service represents one of those 527 lives that is forever changed, a survivor that will be healed, and another minute of hope being given to those who need it most. Call to Freedom and the amazing community of support around us have done much to provide services, but we also faced new and growing threats.

Technology-facilitated abuse emerged as a growing concern; we served 92 survivors directly impacted by this evolving threat. Traffickers are increasingly using digital platforms for grooming and control, and Call to Freedom is leading the response. This past year, we not only served survivors affected by these tactics but also laid the groundwork for new prevention, intervention, and restoration strategies specifically designed to combat them. Call to Freedom is committed to expanding our services as rapidly as new threats emerge.

The outcomes we achieved together in 2024 speak volumes: every client surveyed reported that they felt welcomed and supported, felt like they were more prepared to handle daily life, and gained valuable safety planning. These results are not just statistics; they represent profound transformation and survivors reclaiming their dignity, rediscovering their value, and finding the strength to thrive. As we look ahead, we remain deeply grateful for the partnerships that sustain our mission. Together, we are building a community where survivors can heal, families can stay together, and young people are protected from exploitation. Thank you for walking alongside us in this work. With your continued support, we will keep answering the Call to Freedom.

2024 Bush Prize for Community Innovation

In 2024, Call to Freedom was deeply honored as the recipient of the prestigious Bush Prize: South Dakota for Community Innovation. This award, presented by the South Dakota Community Foundation in partnership with the Bush Foundation, celebrates organizations driving transformative change in their communities. This esteemed recognition highlights our relentless commitment to addressing the complex and pervasive issue of human trafficking through innovative, collaborative, and sustainable solutions.

The Bush Prize acknowledges organizations that not only tackle pressing challenges but also create innovative replicable models that inspire broader impact. Selected through a rigorous evaluation process, Call to Freedom was assessed by a distinguished panel of community leaders and industry experts. The review focused on Call to Freedom's ability to deliver measurable outcomes, build and grow inclusive partnerships with other organizations, and sustain long-term innovation and change. This recognition is a great highlight of Call to Freedom's holistic approach to empowering survivors, from providing comprehensive support services to building community-wide coalitions that prevent exploitation.

At the heart of Call to Freedom's work is a commitment to hope and healing. Call to Freedom's services and unique Continuum of Care model reflect the organization's belief that every individual deserves a path to freedom and dignity. The Bush Prize validates that belief and importantly the tireless efforts of Call to Freedom staff, volunteers, and partners who work every day to create a future where every person has the right to live with freedom, dignity, and respect.

A MESSAGE FROM OUR BOARD CHAIR

As we look back at 2024, we reflect on standards we've set for ourselves – unity, collaboration, and innovation. We review our accomplishments and ask ourselves what has gone well and what could we do better? We also look forward, identifying potential challenges we may face and determining what path is best to take.

Throughout 2024, the need for a single office location became more evident for Call to Freedom. We needed to not only “come together” in our fight against human trafficking, but we felt a need to “be together” under one roof to strengthen our team and our services. Uniting administration and client services under one roof would allow us to enhance interdepartmental efficiencies, strengthen relationships within the team, and allow for the most efficient use of time, resources, and energy while providing services for our clients.

We set out to find a safe and cost-effective location from which both client services and administration could operate efficiently. A suitable new location would ensure the safety of clients and staff while improving organizational culture and staff well-being. We desired a location which would meet our current workloads and allow for continued growth of services and programs, while assuring we maintain the present award-winning quality of our comprehensive services.

In 2024, we finally located a space that met our vision for growth. Thanks to the incredible generosity of two benefactors, we were able to secure future use of the building, with plans to purchase it in 2027. In a major step forward, we were honored in 2024 to have been selected for the 2027 Greater Sioux Falls Chamber of Commerce Community Appeals campaign. This endorsement affirms the strength of our mission and impact, and places Call to Freedom among a select group of nonprofits recognized as worthy community investments. Through the Chamber's structured and trusted process, we will gain vital support from the business community, positioning us to build long-term sustainability and expand our reach in meaningful ways.

Call to Freedom remained deeply committed to prevention education and outreach in 2024, hosting more than 565 training sessions and reaching over 7,200 individuals. A key prevention focus of 2024 was the growing issue of “sextortion”—a form of technology-facilitated abuse that disproportionately impacts children and youth. Through targeted presentations and community partnerships, we equipped kids, families, and professionals with the tools to recognize, prevent, and respond to this emerging threat. When addressing human trafficking, Call to Freedom takes a multifaceted, trauma-informed approach tailored to each individual's unique circumstances. In 2024 alone, 300 new client referrals entered Call to Freedom's Continuum of Care — a comprehensive model that begins with ensuring immediate safety and access to basic needs such as food, clothing, and safe shelter. The need for intervention remains urgent: 78% of those seeking help in 2024 had experienced homelessness at some point during the year.

As the demand for services continued to grow, Call to Freedom responded at unprecedented levels. Over 14,000 services were provided to 527 victims, ranging in age from just 4 to 70 years old. Sixty-five percent of referrals came from Minnehaha or Lincoln County, underscoring the local impact of trafficking. By the end of 2024, Call to Freedom had supported more than 1,500 survivors on their path to healing, stability, and hope. The Call to Freedom Board of Directors is excited for the future of our clients provided by our dedicated staff and cutting-edge Continuum of Care Model. Call to Freedom will soon celebrate our 10th anniversary. The growth of the organization, our strides towards acquiring our new headquarters, and attention to detail in building a solid foundation of services will serve our clients well as we move forward.

Susan's Story

a Call to Freedom Client

"In January of 2018, I found myself in a desperate and harrowing situation after I lost custody of my two-month-old daughter. Our apartment was nearly vacant, with almost no furniture or other necessities. I was living with the father of my child, and I was naive and blind to the realities of our living situation. In my mind, just having functioning utilities was enough to make a home. Due to this extreme situation and the emotional turmoil I found myself in, while also suffering from severe post-partum depression, life was almost too much to bear. I turned to ecstasy and a myriad of other drugs supplied to me by the father of my child. As anyone who has tried to mask severe pain and trauma with illicit drugs can attest, this did not work well. I ended up in severe manic psychosis due to my drug use and unresolved emotional turmoil. This led me to make further bad decisions, and I eventually found myself in jail.

Due to the extreme fear and desperation I experienced after being released from jail, I found myself homeless on the streets of Houston, clinging to the hope of being reunited with my daughter and finding a stable home for us. With no safe options available, I moved from train to train and bus to bus, simply trying to survive. In this vulnerable state, I met a man who promised to improve my life but instead exploited my circumstances. He knew I had only a single cell phone that didn't even have a plan and on Wi-Fi and quickly took advantage of my isolation. He introduced me to another trafficker who supplied me with ecstasy and forced me onto the streets, where I was made to sell my body. Any money I earned was taken from me, leaving me empty-handed and powerless.

As I walked the boulevard, surrounded by others who were also being exploited, my thoughts were consumed by my daughter. I never wanted this life, and both men knew I was only trying to find a way to get her back. They preyed on my desperation and used threats to control me. After days of wearing the same clothes I had left jail in, with no opportunity to rest, I was told I would be shot if I ever spoke about what was happening. My phone was taken, my freedom stripped, and my life felt as though it was hanging by a thread.

Fast forward to 2022—after moving back to Sioux Falls, SD in 2019—I was referred to Call to Freedom, and it completely transformed my life. Until then, I did not fully realize the impact that trauma had on me: Child Protective Services involvement, the adoption of my firstborn, and the abuse and exploitation I endured had left deep wounds. It wasn't until Specialty Court connected me to Call to Freedom that I began to understand the true weight of it all and finally saw a way forward.

I never knew organizations like this existed. Once I became a client, it felt like I could breathe again. I found a place where I could heal, receive care, and begin to rebuild my life. What I love most about Call to Freedom is not just the generosity of donors, volunteers, and grants, but also the spiritual guidance. That piece has been the root of my healing and the motivation that keeps me moving forward week after week.

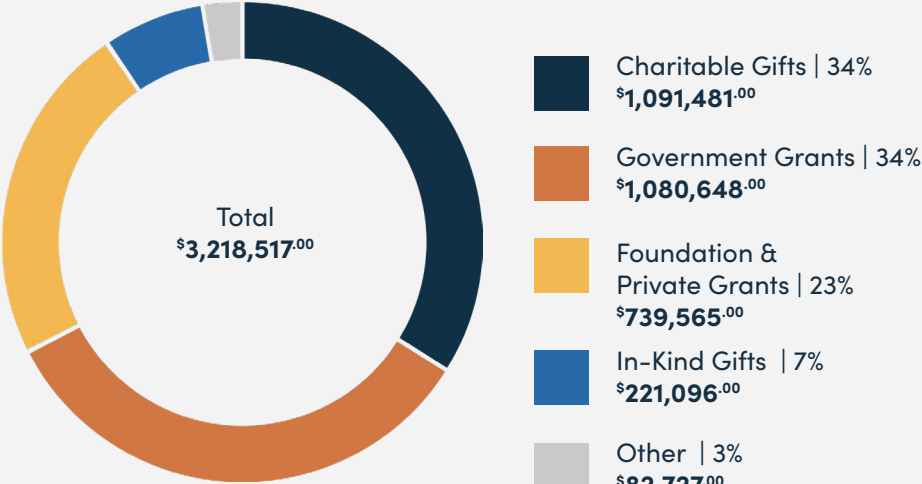
I go in, I pray, and I receive blessings of hope, encouragement, and practical support. From occupational therapy to household needs, I have never felt so supported and uplifted.

I would not have what I have today if it were not for the care and compassion of this Christ-centered, faith-based organization. Call to Freedom helped me grow from a place of vulnerability into strength and confidence. Since 2022, I have been overwhelmed by the tremendous support I've received—whether funding for basic needs, a safe roof over my head, furniture through referrals, or the ability to provide diapers, clothes, and wipes for my new baby. They care about our children as if they were their own family, and to me, that is exactly what Call to Freedom has become—a family."

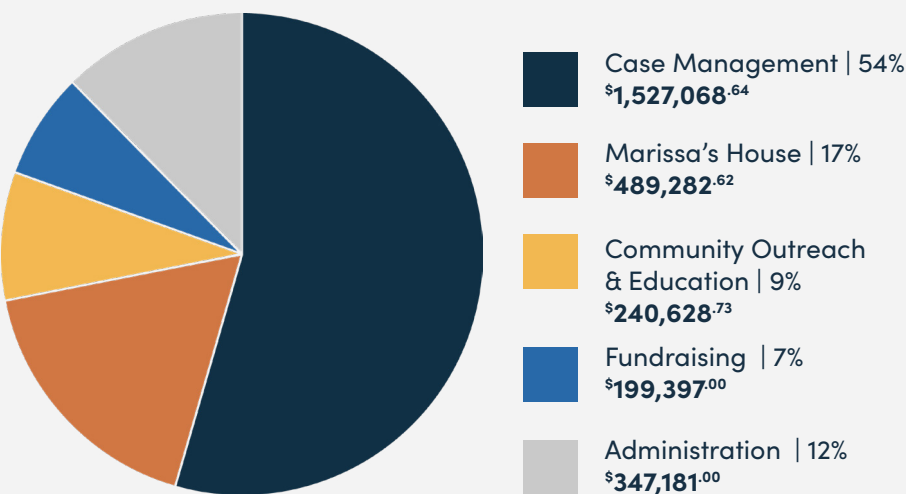

Molly's Story

a Call to Freedom Client

Molly was just 16 years old when she first walked through the doors of Call to Freedom. She was facing a crisis that is becoming all too prevalent in this digital age. What began as an innocent search for friendship and connection through online gaming and social media quickly spiraled into something dangerous.

Predators recognized her vulnerabilities and manipulated her trust, using digital platforms to exploit her and maintain control through fear and coercion.

By the time Molly connected with Call to Freedom, she was overwhelmed by feelings of shame and disappointment. She worried that what had happened to her was somehow her fault and struggled to believe she deserved help. But at Call to Freedom, she was met with compassion, understanding, and reassurance that she was not alone and that what happened to her did not define her.

Throughout 2024, Molly has continued a journey of healing with the support of case management and occupational therapy. Step by step, she is learning to rebuild her confidence, regain her independence, and discover new ways to cope with the impact of her trauma. Through therapy, she has been able to process her experiences and improve her mental health, finding a safe place to talk openly about her fears and pain while also celebrating her progress.

Molly has also participated in education around online safety and healthy relationships—tools that empower her to protect herself and recognize her worth. She is beginning to see her own strength emerge, and for the first time in a long while, she is envisioning a future filled with hope.

Today, Molly is not only healing from her past but also growing into the resilient, confident young woman she was always meant to be. With continued support, she is embracing her voice, reclaiming her story, and proving that her circumstances do not define her potential.

In Molly's own words: "When I came to Call to Freedom, I didn't think anyone could understand what I went through. Now, I feel seen, supported, and stronger than I ever thought possible. Thank you to everyone who makes this help available—for believing in me when I couldn't believe in myself."

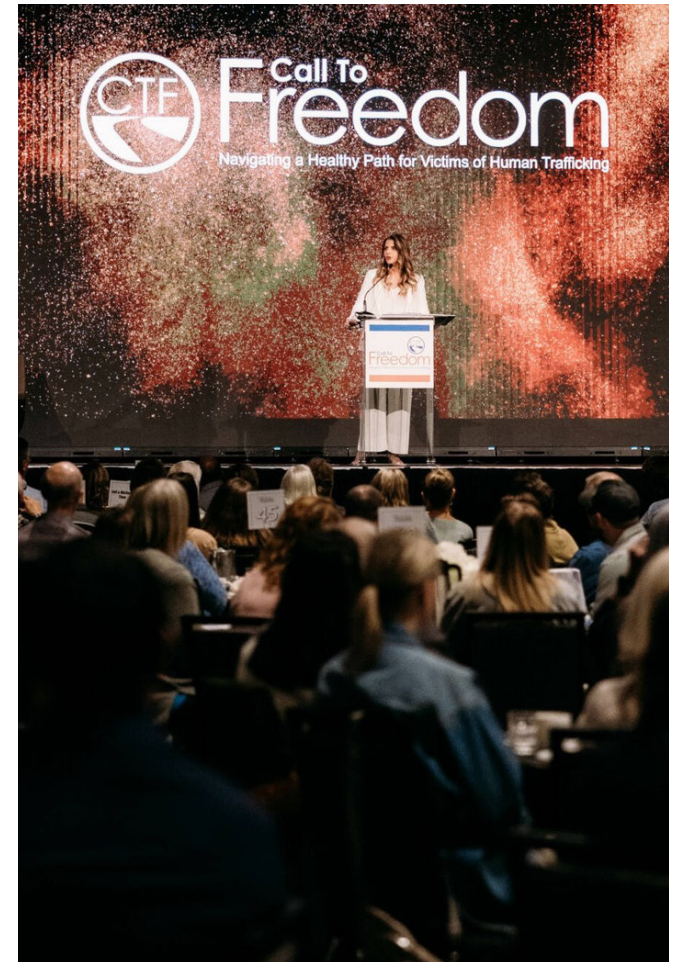


CommUNITY Breakfast
